Year 1- Two Units

Unit 1 - Controlled assessment (internally assessed)

You will Investigate the different types of crime and public perception of crime. You will gain an understanding of why some crimes go unreported to the police and the media.

Unit 2 – Exam (externally assessed)

A study into a series of criminological theories, gaining an understanding of why people commit crime.

Year 2 – Two Units

Unit 3 - Controlled assessment (internally assessed)

Deeper understanding of the criminal justice system. Examine criminal cases and review verdicts. Research into the roles of personnel and processes involved from the moment a crime takes place to the verdict itself is passed.

Unit 4 - Exam (externally assessed)

Apply knowledge of criminological theories to understand how and why we use punishment within criminal justice system to achieve social control. You will learn how to evaluate the effectiveness of social control agencies, such as the Police and the Prison Service, in achieving their aims.
