| Key words  Contraception The pill Condoms Coil Implant Injection  Conception  Agape love  Sexual relationships before marriage  Age of consent Cohabitation | Explained: Roman Catholics believe that artificial contraception goes against natural law and God's plan when he instructed Adam and Eve to 'be fruitful and multiply'. They say that all sex should be 'open to creating new life.' However, Catholics are not against family planning, but think parents should use natural forms of contraception to regulate their family, e.g. sex at the 'least fertile' time of the month.  Most other Christians accept contraception, although some are opposed to the morning after pill as they see it as a form of murder and against the commandment 'You shall not murder'.  Church of England accept people should only have as many children as they are able to care for therefore would accept contraception, not to stop children completely but to regulate the number of children – this could be argued the 'most loving' thing to do – Jesus promoted 'agape love'.  The Church teaches the only valid place for a sexual relationship is in a marriage. Bible teaching "A man leaves his mother and father and unites with his wife" therefore  Most Christians are opposed to sex before marriage as they believe it is God's plan for a man and woman to have sex within a sexual relationship when they are 'one flesh.'  Modern / Church of England: accept that although marriage is best, people may live together if they are in a loving and committed relationship. | (same as theme                                     | Christians believe that men and women are made in "God's image" and are therefore equal. However traditional teachings state there are different roles:  Catholics- "A man is head of the wife as Christ is head of the church"  Adam and Eve story — Adam created first; Eve created as a helper and companion for Adam, Eve was weak and gave into temptation.  Catholic church / Fundamental Christians will not accept female priests or vicars. "Do not add or subtract to what God has commanded"  Church of England / Liberal Christians accept female priest:  In March 1994, Angela Berners-Wilson was the first woman to be ordained as a priest in the Church of England. She was one of 32 women ordained that day and recalls her long fight to become a priest.  Libby Lane was the first female bishop  Appointed as a bishop by the Church of England, after its General Synod voted in July 2014 to allow women to become bishops. ## Adultery

Christians are against adultery as it breaks the marriage vows and goes against the commandment 'You shall not commit adultery.'

Divorce, including reasons for divorce, and remarrying People get divorced for a number of reasons including adultery, work and money pressures, domestic violence and addiction.

The nature and purpose of marriage

Its purpose is to provide a loving relationship in which to enjoy sex, provide safety and stability for children and to educate children in the Christian faith.

Roman Catholics believe that marriage is a sacrament and that a man and wife are 'one flesh' until one of them dies. Catholics can separate but cannot remarry while their partner is alive.



Christians believe that marriage is a part of God's plan for humanity, that it takes place between a man and a woman and should be for life.

Other Christians believe that divorce is the lesser of two evils and should sometimes be allowed out of love and compassion for a couple.
