HMS Vanessa is detached from Convoy HX213 to join Convoy SC107. The convoy is attacked by a wolfpack of U-boats – over 4 days they sink 15 ships. It is the heaviest loss of ships from any trans-Atlantic convoy through the winter of 1942-43. Gordon Collett is 19, from Sheffield – the city of Steel. Determined to join the fight against the advancing forces of fascism, he volunteers for the Royal Navy in February 1940. He serves on HMS Vanessa and in November 1942 they are sent to escort Convoy SC107. I know this because I am his son – and I'm going to tell you, his story.

318 Education Trust 'Play Day' Friday 27th September 2024



Parental Seminar – Home learning and Systems feedback

Thank you to all who attended the parental seminar on Home Learning and School Systems led by Mrs. Mincher and Mr. Beards earlier this week. In this segment of the Spotlight, you will find a comprehensive overview of the Home Learning approach implemented at our school.



Knowledge Rich



- 1. Homework has a positive impact on average (+ 5 months), particularly with pupils in secondary schools.
- 2. Some pupils may not have a quiet space for home learning – it is important for schools to consider how home learning can be supported (e.g. through providing homework clubs for pupils).
- 3. Homework that is linked to classroom work tends to be more effective. In particular, studies that included feedback on homework had higher impacts on learning.
- 4. It is important to make the purpose of homework clear to pupils (e.g. to increase a specific area of knowledge, or to develop fluency in a particular area).

Why do we set home learning?

Home learning (homework) is an integral part of effective teaching and learning at school. The Education Endowment Foundation, who are an educational charity focussing on meta-research to judge the effectiveness of different teaching and learning strategies, make the conclusion that: 'On average, the impact of homework on learning is consistently positive (leading to on average five months' additional progress)' (annual).

What does home learning look like?

- 1. Space learning repetition of factual knowledge.
- 2. Multiple choice questioning electronic system to check understanding.
- 3. Vocabulary tasks designed to embed pupil understanding of tier 3 words.
- 4. Reading reading comprehension, inference, and analysis.
- 5. Writing description, explanation, analysis and evaluation.

KS4 & KS5 pupils should expect exam questions and other extended reading and writing tasks to be part of the home learning tasks set.

Home Learning Frequency

To facilitate proficiency with the school's electronic systems for setting tasks, Year 7 students will commence home learning with a staggered approach. During the first two full academic weeks, home learning assignments will be exclusively set by the ICT department, focusing on familiarising students with the school

system. Starting in the third week, students will be assigned weekly tasks in both English and Mathematics, continuing until the October half-term.

In the second half-term, Science home learning will be introduced. Following this, in academic term two, home learning tasks will be assigned in the remaining subjects according to the frequency timetable below.

Throughout the first term, Year 7 students will also receive additional training and guidance on how to access, complete, and submit the various home learning tasks.

KS5

All subjects have 9 teaching hours per week. Each subject should set up to 5 hours of home learning weekly. The average pupil will have 15 hours of home learning.

There are 5 hours of directed study periods on a typical Sixth Form pupil timetable. They should use this time to complete home learning tasks as well as complete additional revision activities and produce lesson summary notes (10 hours). The recommended outside lesson 'learning' is 20-25 hours.

Sixth Form pupils there should make use of the following resources to aid revision such as:

- Knowledge organisers.
- Golden questions.
- Directed study revision strategy booklet.
- Write up subject notes and create topic flash cards.
- Use model answers and implement the blurting technique to practise exam papers.

What are Knowledge organisers?

- Knowledge organisers are available of our school website.
- Knowledge organisers categorise, clarify, and condense the Golden Knowledge of a particular topic and arranging the information into a user-friendly format.
- Pupils should use them as revise aid.

What are Golden questions? These questions are designed to retrieve Golden Knowledge. These questions have derived from the knowledge organisers. They can be set as home learning tasks, used to shape a do it now task as well as support a pupil's revision. For additional home learning, a pupil could download both the knowledge organiser and the golden questions for a topic and have a go at answering them. Teachers may set golden questions as part of their home learning assignments.

How is home learning set?

All home learning tasks will be set through Microsoft teams.

Pupils will receive a notification that an assignment has been set.

How pupils use team's assignment:

- Pupils should download the teams app and log in using school email/password.
- Pupils should check teams daily. On the 'general page' teachers will place the lessons on there to allow for pupils to access lesson PowerPoints & resources. These lessons will be accessible for pupils in reintegration or pupils who are ill and as a consequence absence from school.
- If a home learning assignment is set, pupils will see a red number on the 'bell' icon. Pupils should click on this and follow the instructions from there.

How parents view pupils home learning?

Parents can access pupils home learning assignments via Haldor Homework. You will need to download the app.



For the first time logging on you have to create a password for your Haldor-account.

Parents and guardians – Haldor Support

- 1. Click on Forgot your password?
- 2. Enter your email and click Submit.
- 3. You will receive an email with a link where you can create a personal password. If you haven't received the email, please check the junk mail folder!
- 4. When you have chosen a password, go to parent.haldoredu.com or download the mobile app Haldor Parent and log in using your email and new password.

Rewards for Home learning:

Dependent on the task set the teacher will incorporate some form of checking for understanding of the home learning in a future lesson. This will come through the 'Do it now' task or through questioning.

Somme home learning tasks will formulate part of the formal assessment process and will involve the teacher taking the work in (if written) and giving formal written feedback.

The teacher will also check and reward pupils for completion of home learning through Arbor where a subject house point will be issued.

Sanctions for incompletion:

Pupil does not submit HW 1:

- Teacher should issue a warning to the pupil(s) and give an extension at their discretion. Log onto Arbor as 'Failure to complete HW1'. This will have a 0-demerit weighting.
- If a pupil fails to meet the extension deadline at HW 1 a subject detention will be set whereby the assignment will be completed.

Pupils does not submit HW 2:

•Teacher should issue a subject detention whereby the assignment will be completed. Record on Arbor.

Pupils does not submit HW 3:

• Teacher should make contact via email to parent/carer and issue a further subject detention. Referral to also to be made to Head of Year.

Teaching and Learning



Every Wednesday, teachers participate in a professional development session to share their expertise. This week, the focus was on 'Catch-up' learning. As a school, we aim to improve our support for students who miss lessons due to illness or participation in school events, such as visits or sports fixtures, to help them effectively catch up on their learning. While nothing can fully replace in-class learning, which is why school attendance is crucial, we understand that students may occasionally be absent.

To address this, teachers will now create a blue 'Catch-up' slide, which will be posted on Teams along with the lesson resources. If a student misses a lesson due to illness or participation in a school activity, they will be able to easily access the 'Catch-up' slide and complete a 10-15 minute knowledge consolidation task covering the key concepts of the lesson. While students are always encouraged to complete all lesson tasks, the 'Catch-up' slide is designed to make the process of catching up both manageable and accessible.

We will also be offering a voluntary 'Academic Catch-up' session after school, supervised by our middle and curriculum leaders, who will be available to support students with their work. If you would like your child to attend this session, you will be able to book it in the same manner as an after-school club. Further details will be provided in upcoming communications as we finalize this support initiative.

Year 7 Catalyst Workshop








This week, the Catalyst Youth Workshop collaborated with our Year 7 students. Led by John Proctor and his dedicated team, the workshop focused on fostering a love for literature among young people.

John Proctor, the author of *Hikaru*, a book written in an allegorical style, centered the session on exploring the unique narrative techniques found in his work. An **allegory** is a narrative in which characters, events, or settings represent abstract ideas or concepts, often conveying a deeper moral, philosophical, or political message. In an allegory, the surface story is symbolic of another, usually more significant, meaning. This allows the author to convey complex ideas or truths in a more accessible or engaging way.



The allegory in *Hikaru* reflects the beliefs, teachings, and messages of the Christian faith.



As part of the workshop, each student received a copy of *Hikaru: Act 1*. We hope this gift inspires them to delve deeper into the story and continue their literary journey.

Arbor Logging absences on the Parent Portal and Arbor App

It is now possible to record absences on the Parent Portal and Arbor App. You can only record sameday absences, so for any extended or future absences, please contact your child's school.

Recording an absence


To record an absence, click on the Quick Actions button and then click Attendance.



From here, click the green Log Absence button in the top-right of the page.



Here, you can input the start and end time for the absence and type in the reason for the absence. By default, the absence start and end times reflect the student's full day, but these can be adjusted as needed. Once you have filled in this data, click Log Absence. This will then be visible to school staff.




Reason -Please provide full details e.g. College interview, sport activity, family funeral Please provide Symptoms if absence is due to illness e.g. vomiting, sore throat, twisted ankle

Once this has been logged, school staff can accept or reject the absence. Approved absences appear in the **Attendance** tab of the Parent Portal or Arbor App.



Editing or deleting absence requests

It is not possible to edit an existing absence request, so if you need to make any changes, you should delete the absence request and create a new one. To delete the absence, click on it and then click Cancel Change Request.



Please note: It is not possible to delete an absence once it has been approved by your school. If you need to make any changes after this has happened, please contact your school.

Parental letter from Mrs Caldwell – Assistant Head Teacher Behaviour & Attendance.

Dear Parent/Carer

We know that sometimes our pupils cannot come to school because they are really unwell - and that's the right thing to do for them and other students. Medical advice is clear however that children with mild illness will often be well enough to attend - for example if they have a cough, or cold, without a temperature. Please see the guidance at the end of this letter for more information on common illnesses.

We also know that pupils fall behind their friends and classmates when they miss school. At William Brookes school we want the amount of missed education to be reduced as much as possible. We believe that our community is stronger together, with all of our pupils in school, on time, every day. We are building life skills, life-long friendships and preparing your child for future success.

We also know that you can have a significant effect on absences this academic year and we would really appreciate your help and support ensuring that your child comes to school every day so that they can get the best possible outcomes. We want to work with you to achieve this – please call or come in and meet your child's tutor if there is anything we can do to support you or your child. We appreciate that every family's situation is unique.

Why is regular attendance so important?

Being in school every day that it is open, is important to your child's achievement, wellbeing, and their wider development.


With millions of pupils set to return to schools and colleges over the coming days, there will be a renewed focus on maximising pupils' time in the classroom, as evidence shows that the students with the highest attendance throughout their time in school gain the best GCSE and A Level results.

Here's what the data shows:

- Pupils who did not achieve grade 9 to 4 in English and maths GCSEs had a higher absence rate over the key stage.
- Generally, the higher the percentage of sessions missed across the year resulted in a lower level of attainment at the end of the year.
- Among pupils with no missed sessions over KS4, 83.7% achieved grades 9 to 4 in English and maths compared to 35.6% of pupils who were persistently absent.

There are only a small number of circumstances where missing a school day is permitted.
